From Anxiety to Adventure



Seasons of change can be difficult, but they can also be exciting. Indeed, those times in our lives when

something is changing are often when we grow the most.

I once took a core-values assessment quiz to identify, out of of all that is important to me, my two overarching core values. These core values - mine are integrity and creativity - are positive traits we seek to nurture and develop. However, we each also have a shadow value central to our being that we tend to defend.

I discovered my shadow value is stability. It turns out that, while I may be adept at navigating the roller-coaster ride of change, the loops and quick descents can still make me queasy. Nevertheless, my desire for stability, which brings with it many benefits, may prevent me from seeing the adventures that God imagines for me. At Trinity Cathedral, we've experience significant changes in recent years. From new leadership, staff and ministry structures, to cultural shifts following the pandemic, to retirements of beloved musicians, change continues. These changes and chances of life can fill us with anxiety and pessimism about the future and erode our trust in each another...if we allow them.

Or, we can examine the process and opportunities inherent in every change. We can recognize we are always saying goodbye to some things while also embracing new ones that can bring us closer to God.

The crucial skill here is the ability to identify anxiety, name it, and then unpack it to uncover the potential for adventure that lies within the change at hand.
