# Cathedral Connections

## Welcome Sunday: September 10



Imagine a Hollywood writer's room, or a corporate marketing meeting, where the folks around the table toss out idea after idea to describe something

we all know about, in search of a refreshing new handle to amplify it.

That was a little what it was like this summer as the Trinity Cathedral staff discerned what to call our first fall Sunday, when we return to our threeservice morning schedule and the beginning of fall programs.

Should we call it "Kickoff" Sunday, as so many churches in America do? There's an inertia to this phrase, as fall brings to mind the beginning of football season that accompanies crisp weather, children returning to school, and a general return to work and routines.

Yet not everyone is wild about football, and more to the point we shouldn't overuse American cultural symbols and language to describe our liturgical and pastoral life. (Though if you tell me after a church that a sermon was a "touchdown" I won't have my feelings hurt).

We then considered a few other terms: what about "Homecoming" Sunday, or "Rally" Sunday, or even "Gathering" Sunday? We even tested out the "Rally" Sunday idea for a few months. Each said a little about what we hoped for: a day when Trinity members could celebrate the return from summer and begin an exciting season together.

Yet each didn't fit for some reason. "Homecoming" is a little too close to homegoing, which is a different thing entirely. "Rally" implies a party with festival bounce houses . . . maybe someday, but we're not quite there yet. And "Gathering" Sunday is lovely but a little bit bland.

Then, someone suggested **Welcome Sunday** to describe the day we return to three services and begin our fall formation programming. We were intrigued. What better way to return and gather than with a word of intentional welcome and embrace?

But isn't every Sunday a welcoming Sunday at Trinity? Well, yes, it is, and that's the point.

Welcome Sunday is both an event and a symbol, a day to begin again but also a reminder that every Sunday is a day to offer welcome, to greet the stranger, and to celebrate the image of God in one another.

## UBE Sunday September 17



Trinity will celebrate UBE Sunday on September 17, honoring the feast day of Alexander Crummel (pictured above) whose work laid the foundation for United Black Episcopalians.

Organized in 1968 as the Union of Black Clergy and Laity, the Union is the proud inheritor of the work of these people and earlier organizations, the Convocation of Colored Clergy, the Conference of Church Workers Among Colored People, all dedicated to the ministry of Blacks in the Episcopal Church. The name was changed to the Union of Black Episcopalians in 1971.

The Union of Black Episcopalians is a confederation of more than 55 chapters and interest groups in United States and the Caribbean. The Union also has members in Canada, Africa and Latin America.

#### **MISSION TEAMS**

There will be a retreat for Mission Teams on Sunday, September 17, 2023. Teams will have the opportunity to reflect on goal accomplishment and on the new structure.

#### THE CAPITAL PLANT

Reparation and restoration is underway for five stained glass windows, four in the Cathedral and one in the music room. Parish House masonry continues, is going well, and will be completed in early September. Cathedral Hall floor refinishing was completed in August as the last item to be addressed from the second-floor bathroom leak in December 2022. Our new sound system installation begins Sept. 12.

#### **ADULT FAITH FORMATION**

Did you know that you can break up your week by attending activities on Wednesday evenings? This summer the Inquirer's Class has been offered, as well as Bible study, and Trinity Forums, which were well-attended.

Bible study classes on Sundays at 9 a.m. were a great success, as well; one delightful feature was the large diversity of skilled presenters from the congregation!

#### HAPPY NOTES ON FINANCES

Pledge payments are ahead of commitments! In addition, there has been an increase in the value of the endowment thus enabling the percentage draw on the endowment to be reduced. Further, expenses for the year are within budget.

#### **BY-LAW CHANGES**

The Vestry is considering revising the by-laws so that it will no longer be required that the parish Treasurer is a vestry member. This change, which requires a congregational vote, does not indicate any concern regarding the competency of our sitting Treasurer, rather, it is a back-up plan in the event that there is no person on the vestry who is willing and able to fulfill the role.

## ADULT FAITH FORMATION

#### **Mission Team Reflections** by The Rev. Adrienne Koch, Priest Associate

The word liturgy comes to English from the Greek concept of public service. Liturgy connects us to God and to others in the same way religious communities have found connection for centuries, through prayer and work.

Our bodies move, hands lifted in "orans" (Latin for "pleading") position during the Lord's Prayer; kneeling for Eucharist at the 8 a.m. service, or making pilgrimage to the high altar on a feast day. Our bodies pray and work in some way every time we gather as people of faith.

And this summer, those who explored the Psalms during the Adult Formation hour bible study, examined one of our earliest liturgical prayer books – the songs and poems set to music by the ancients who worshipped the same God we worship.

The Psalms remain an integral part of Episcopal prayer, and in many ways capture the essence of the emotional work all human beings must do in this life. The Psalms capture the soul's praise and lamentations, remembrances and hopes.

The Adult Faith Formation Mission Team has been working with Kerygma (the word in Greek means "proclamation") bible studies, such as the Psalms study. The Kerygma Program has been offering accessible curriculums for 40 years, and the Mission Team is utilizing its works for the 2023-2024 program year at Trinity.

Just as we explored the living liturgical history of the Psalms, we will also explore the living history of the Old and New Testaments this fall and upcoming spring. Come and learn with our team of excellent lay and clergy facilitators who offer insightful instruction and dialogical reflections each week.

The Adult Faith Formation Mission Team has seen some changes since the new Mission Team structure took shape last year. We are focusing our bible studies on long-term accessible curriculums on Sunday mornings, and professional studies with academics and guest speakers on Wednesday nights after Evensong.

We're also shifting the traditional Lent and Advent retreats Trinity has offered to other dates and times of the year based on the themes and speakers we want to learn from.

Weekend Retreats and Sunday Trinity Forums (in which the dean interviews inspiring speakers of our day) allow us to hear how God is at work in the world around us and inspire our community to engage our faith in both prayer and public service.

This fall we look forward to learning alongside the Rev. Becca Stevens of Thistle Farms, religious professor and author Timothy Beal, and President of CSU Laura Bloomberg. We hope you'll join us for these and other events during this year's Adult Faith Formation Mission Team programming.
