The Dean's Corner: The Dignity of Democracy No on Issue 1

On August 8th, Ohio voters will decide on Issue 1, which would raise the threshold of approving constitutional amendments to 60%, up from its current required simple majority. At Trinity Cathedral, we have advocated for the current proposed amendment to protect reproductive rights, so we know well that this is a targeted attempt to disrupt a democratic process which could assure access to abortion and reproductive healthcare. I encourage you to vote, and to vote **no** on this issue.



Though The Episcopal Church honors a diversity of faithful responses to the question of abortion, we are very clear that no governmental action should restrict a woman's right to make decisions regarding reproductive healthcare, and act on those decisions.

Greater Cleveland Congregations Urges "No" Vote on Ohio Issue 1

Issue 1 would require a 60% majority from voters to approve an amendment to the Ohio Constitution instead of a simple majority of 50.1%, the same simple majority it takes for an official to be voted into office.

Greater Cleveland Congregation's (GCC's) commitment to democracy is longterm and Issue 1 is a direct threat to our democracy. They urge a no vote on issue 1 for the August 8 election. <u>Click here for more information</u> on GCC's position on the issue.

Special elections have one of the lowest turnout rates of any election. Using their successful Neighborhood Captain model, GCC will push turnout in targeted low-propensity neighborhoods and, of course, push their leaders and supporters to vote as well!

GCC recommends vote-by-mail to ensure you get your vote in during your busy summer. We also recommend vote-by-mail because of recent changes to Voter ID requirements that many Ohioians may not be aware of and may not be able to secure an ID prior to the August 8th special election.

Working to Abolish Ohio's Death Penalty
