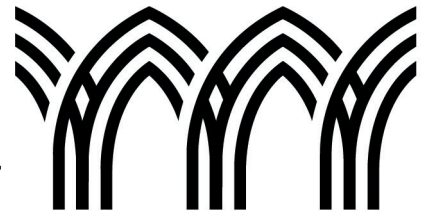

## THE GENERAL THANKSGIVING

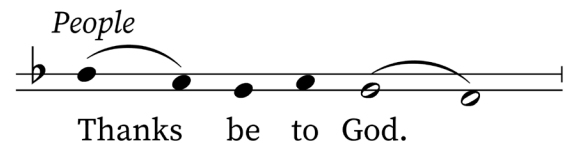
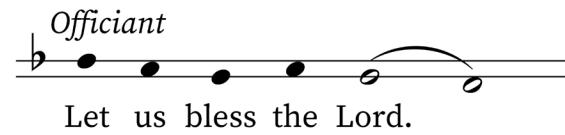

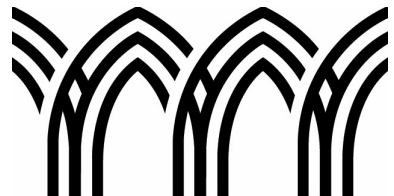

## ABOUT EVENSONG

In the monastic tradition of the western church, the “hours” are appointed times for prayer throughout the day.

matins/lauds (*in the night*), prime (*sunrise*), terce (9AM), sext (12PM),  
none (3PM), vespers (*sunset*), compline (*bedtime*)

This cycle of prayer, known as the **Daily Office**, includes psalms, canticles, antiphons, responsories, hymns, versicles and responses, readings, and prayers.

Archbishop Thomas Cranmer (1489-1556) simplified and reduced these hours into the liturgies **Morning Prayer** (Matins) and **Evening Prayer** (Evensong).

Choral Evensong is sung Evening Prayer; the choir sings the psalmody, the canticles (Magnificat & Nunc dimittis) and an anthem, while the congregation participates vicariously, listening attentively to the choir’s and Precentor’s offering of music and to the proclamation of the Scriptures.

## TERMS

### **Antiphon**

A verse sung before and usually after a psalm, canticle, or hymn text. It is often drawn from scripture (especially the psalms) and is appropriate to the liturgical season or occasion.

### **Canticle**

A non-metrical song used in liturgical worship. Latin for a “little song.”

### **Responsory**

Prayers with responses.

### **Preces**

A brief responsive prayers which are often based on verses of scripture, especially the Psalter. Latin for “prayers.”

### **Versicle**

The first half of a set of preces, said or sung by an officiant or cantor and answered with a spoken or sung response by the congregation or choir.

### **Suffrage**

A series of intercessory prayers or petitions.

“Evensong hangs on the wall of English life like an old, familiar cloak passed through the generations. Rich with prayer and scripture, it is nevertheless totally nonthreatening. It is a service into which all can stumble without censure—a rambling old house where everyone can find some corner to sit and think, to listen with half-attention, trailing a few absentminded fingers of faith or doubt in its passing stream. Most religious celebrations gather us around a table of some sort. They hand us a book or a plate, or speak a word of demanding response. They want to ‘touch’ us. Choral Evensong is a liturgical expression of Christ’s *Nolle me tangere* —‘Do not touch me. I have not yet ascended to my Father’ (St. John 20:17). It reminds us that thresholds can be powerful places of contemplation; and that leaving someone alone with their thoughts is not always denying them hospitality or welcome”. *Stephen Hough*
